## (33) The Final Question and Answer

## But, Paul, how can God still judge us for sin?...9:19-21

What question does Paul now anticipate, and answer? vs.19

If God chooses some, why does He still blame (condemn) us? Who can resist Him?

Paul answers this final challenge with a series of other questions. What's the first? vs.20a

Who are you, O man, to talk back to God? This is the heart of the whole matter.

It's also important here to note what he does NOT argue in response. List a few...

Every man has free will. God knew who would have faith. It's up to you...

If any of these traditional arguments were valid, this is the time and place. But instead, what?

One of the strongest statements yet of the Sovereignty of God. He is totally sovereign.

What is his second question? vs.20b

Shall what is formed question the former? "Why did you make me like this?"

And while we're still pondering this, what's his next immediate question? vs.21

Example: Doesn't a potter have authority over the clay? To make his will known?

What's the obvious answer to all these questions?

We're not qualified to question, talk back, challenge motives or results! Period.

## The only explanation given...9:22-33

Paul now explains God's actions. What's his first point? vs.22a

What if God chose to show His wrath/power, patiently endured the objects of His wrath?

How are these *objects of His wrath* described? vs.22b

They are self-prepared for destruction. This is not God's act, but theirs. (Gr is passive).

And at the same time, what if He Himself chose other *objects of His mercy*, for glory!? vs.23-24

That's exactly what He did! Of Jew & Gentile, the Church, the Bride of Christ. Eph.2:6

Demonstrating that this teaching is not "new", what does he show next? vs.25-26

Regarding the calling/choosing of some of the Gentiles, quote from Hos.2:23.

Then, regarding the Jews, he shows what? vs.27-28 Is.10:22

That Isaiah predicted the called remnant saved within all of Israel. God chooses to save...

What very important point about God's mercy is seen through Isaiah in verse 29?

Without God's mercy, Israel would have been destroyed like Sodom/Gomorrah!

Comparing Gentiles with Israel, what's the conclusion? vs.30-31

Gentiles, not looking, found righteousness (in Christ). Jews, were looking, (in Law), didn't!

And the obvious question from this? vs.32a And answer? vs.32b-33

Jews pursued works, not faith. They stumbled over Christ, a Rock of offense (to works).
